Earlier this year it was announced that Jean Reid, a member of Warwick UC, was to be awarded the Moderators Medal in recognition of more than 70 years



service to our congregations, the wider church and community. Jean is well known to youth workers and young people, ministers, pastoral carers, teachers, women's groups, Presbytery members... for her stalwart support and willingness to step in where needed. She filled the gap when ministers moved on before a replacement could be arranged, ensuring that all the various groups continued in worship, witness and service.

From her youth Jean has contributed to the life & work of the church teaching, preaching, encouraging - being "a wellspring of faith development through fellowship, friendship and spiritual development". In reflection on her service, people have spoken of her as someone who guided them in times of uncertainty and struggle. Who leant a listening ear, if they wanted to test their ideas and plans.

In short, a mentor to many who still value the words of wisdom, of caution, of encouragement she offered. Thankful for the times she gave someone a push to use their gifts.

Jean says that she is not unique or unusual, there are many Christians like her across the church nation wide. They strengthen the church and contribute to its work of spreading the gospel and ministering to their communities.

For the past 5 years St Stephens have opened their Church Hall on a Wednesday evening to welcome up to 10 homeless Guests. On a Wednesday afternoon the Shower Trailer & Bedding Trailer are parked on the church grounds ready to be unpacked by a team of Volunteers. Our first group of Volunteers arrived in the afternoon to make beds & set the tables ready for the night ahead. The Evening Team came in around 5pm. Our Guests & Volunteers all sit down to an evening meal. At 10pm the Nightshift come in to take over until 6am. The Morning Crew arrived to cook a hot breakfast for our Guests & to pack the trailers ready to move on to the next Church. Each week it takes approximately 25 volunteers to run our Shelter.

At St Stephens we have past Guests who come back each year to Volunteer. James was a Guest the first year, and after finding accommodation he has returned each year to volunteer. He has been the Shift Leader for the Afternoon Team for the past 3 years, a role he takes very seriously. Steve was a Guest 3 years ago, and after finding accommodation he has returned each year. You will find Steve at our Hall most Wednesdays from 4pm & he stays until 6am the following morning.

Each year there is always that one story that touches your heart. On a Wednesday you will find Ivan either outside on a seat talking to the Guests or on the couch in the Hall. Ivan sits quietly listening to their stories, never judging. One guest after spending the afternoon talking with him, decided he would reach out to his father. He hadn't been in contact with his Dad for a very long time due to the choices he had made in his life. It was lovely to hear that his Dad had returned his call & they are now having regular contact. This Guest now has employment & is in a share house with other tradies.

Severnlea's beginnings.....

A meeting was held on an unknown date at the home of Mr and Mrs Townsend to discuss having a church at Severnlea. It was attended by Rev. John Murray, Will Townsend, Stan Carnell, Bernie Kerridge, Norman Mikklesen and Selim Kerrridge. The Severnlea Methodist Church was opened on 24th November 1945 by Rev G.W. Pettendrigh.

The original building was built in Tannymorel in 1902, moved to Amiens in 1920 to serve the Soldiers Settlement, and moved to Severnlea in 1945.. It was almost derelict at the time. It was built on crown land (with permission) and the transfer was not complete until 1950. The work of pulling down, re-erecting and relining the building, was carried out, and organ, hymn books and church furniture were acquired. Rev Murray built the pulpit, communion rail, communion table and hymn board using timber originally purchased by Rev Murray for his wife's dining room suite. Various aspects of establishing the property were carried out by voluntary labour. Eventually (1963) power was connected and the church stuccoed as we see it today.

From its opening the congregation began to work for the benefit of the community and Fetes/Spring Fairs were started. A bus brought people from town and the Stanthorpe Brass Band played. There were stalls, afternoon tea and, in later years, a Children's Art Competition.

The Ladies' Guild (later Fellowship) helped send food parcels to England up until 1947. They supported Frontier Services and raised funds for the local Chaplaincy committee by holding a morning tea which averaged over \$1000 per year for the first 11 years. (I don't know the total until they stopped during Covid but it was in excess of \$20,000). They also organized family teas.

A Christmas Tree was held each year to thank the Severnlea community for their support. All Severnlea children east of the Severn River were invited as well as Sunday School students.

And always God was worshipped, prayers were prayed, praise and thanksgiving was offered, baptisms, confirmations and the everyday work of Christians in

Severnlea was carried out.
