

Older Persons Month

The Uniting Church in Australia has been shaped and sustained by the quiet, steady faithfulness of people like the Rev Don Pederick. Recently, Don celebrated his 100th birthday and 69 years of ordained ministry, recognised recently at the Western Australia Synod. Raised on a farm in WA, Don was the eldest of six children. Life on the land was simple and grounded in faith, thanks to the strong Christian example set by his parents.

"I felt the call of God to ministry. Full stop. I followed". That sense of surrender carried Don through decades of full-time ministry. Don's pastoral care left a lasting impression on the many communities he served. "The things I'm proud of are things that happened in little ways," he says. "Even today, I bump into people who say, 'You helped me through so-and-so,' and they remind me of a situation I had almost forgotten. Their life was changed by that."



The world has changed dramatically during Don's lifetime – from the way we live, to the way we communicate, to the way we do church. He notes that the shift from minister-centred leadership to a greater emphasis on lay leadership has been significant. "We're drawing on the lay leadership and being more biblical in our approach to church fellowship," he says.

Technology has played a surprising role in Don's ministry. "I.T. has taken over," he grins. "Unless you are I.T. literate, you're behind." Don has embraced technology in his later years and these skills have helped him stay connected and engaged in ministry, even in retirement.

When reflecting on moments of difficulty, Don's answer is always the same: trust in God. "My faith was tested on several occasions," he says, "but the way I got through it was simply trusting Him every day. It might have been a simple trust, but it was a sure trust."

Don offers straightforward advice: be faithful. "No one expects you to be like your neighbour. You are unique. You have a special ministry to give and what God requires of you is faithfulness. If you believe in God and believe in Jesus Christ, you give your life to them and follow their path — whatever anyone else may dictate. There'll be many side tracks but faithfulness is the thing that's going to count at the end."

Don Pederick's story is not just one of longevity, but a legacy of faithfulness, service, humility and love that continues to ripple through the lives of those he's touched.

The Beginnings of Millmerran Uniting Church



In 1977 the Presbyterian Church in Millmerran voted not to join the union, and as there was no Methodist or Congregational churches in the area, those who wanted to be part of the Uniting Church, had nowhere to meet. For the next 5 years they worshipped in the Lutheran Church under the leadership of Rev Joan Johannson, and began to build a new congregation. One of the earliest efforts was the establishment of a Girls Brigade, which continued for 44 years.

In 1982 they were officially recognised as a congregation of the Uniting Church and the Church

Council began a search for a building. The worship centre for the Parish of Millmerran was formerly a Masonic Lodge in Cecil Plains. It was purchased and relocated to Florence St, Millmerran in June 1989. The land and building costs were funded with grants from Qld Synod, the Wagner Estate from Pittsworth Parish, as well as Blue Nursing so that a subcentre of Toowoomba Blue Nursing could be set up with a treatment room and office at the church.

The church building was refurbished to include the Worship Centre, vestry, kitchenette, meeting rooms, Blue Nursing treatment room and office, wheelchair accessible toilets and shower. Later on, a storage room was added to store the resources needed for the various activities using the church building. Our Worship Centre was dedicated on 17th March 1990 by the Moderator Rev. Don Whebell.

The church became the meeting place for the Millmerran Girls Brigade, Ladies fellowship group, Blue Nursing Auxiliary and Millmerran Uniting Church Social club. In 1993 Millmerran and Pittsworth parishes amalgamated to form Central Downs Parish with a minister based in Pittsworth. The Millmerran manse was no longer needed as a minister's residence, so we have chosen to rent it out as affordable housing, which we are still able to do, thanks to our willing members who assist with maintenance when necessary.

As years went by these activities folded but this enabled the building to be used in alternative ways. It is currently used by Blue Care Respite, Mainly Music, morning exercise classes for a range of ability levels as well as an Employment agency for people who find it difficult to seek out suitable employment opportunities. Only Mainly Music is run by our parish volunteers, all the other activities are run by other agents within our community. It is great to see people availing themselves of these activities on most days of each week. It has also become a significant source of income to our parish.

Our Mainly Music ministry to young families has grown amazingly and we were fortunate to be gifted a play fort from a Kindergarten in Pittsworth. We were also approved for a grant from Millmerran Power Agencies to erect a child safe fence around the play fort. Located in front of our church building on the grass area, it makes our Worship Centre an inviting multi-functional activity hub.
